We feel sure that all of you who attended the Melbourne Chamber Orchestra concert in May would have enjoyed it thoroughly. In the second half, the orchestra was augmented by the 29 string students who had taken part in the Advanced String Players Workshops. Congratulations to you all and special thanks to Paul Wright and other members of the orchestra who mentored the students, and also to Mark Irwin, Geelong College and Wendy Galloway who co-ordinated the three workshops. As Dr Malcolm John said in his review "The result was an inspiration, and the massed strings produced a sonorous and memorable performance."

That concert marked the end of a long regional tour by the orchestra but they remained fresh and full of energy for our concert. They delighted us with the oftenhumorous Telemann Don Quixote Suite and we were full of admiration for the talents of both Katherine Lukey, soloist in the Bach Violin Concerto and William Hennessy in the Weiland Concerto that was written especially for him. The evening concluded with the beautiful Tchaikowsky Serenade for Strings. The orchestra is planning to release a CD of serenades in the future.

We were delighted to have had a full house on the night as this created a great atmosphere for the orchestra and the students. Thanks too, to Paul Noonan of Music Den who provided two \$50 vouchers for two lucky students whose names were drawn out of a hat.

**July Concert**. Our next concert will be an exciting performance of piano duets and duos by **duo-pianists Igor Machlak and Olga Kharitonova**, well known both in Australia and internationally. We are lucky to hear them before their tour of Russia and China. We have secured two pianos for the event and the program, **'FROM RUSSIA WITH L...AUGHTER & SMILE'** is expected to include:

You can hear him play in the final with the Tasmanian Symphony Orchestra on Wednesday 28 July on ABC Classic FM 105.9.

Workshop students will also be interested to know that Richard Pollett, the winner of the String final is also a student at ANAM and studies with Paul Wright. That is an inspiration for our young workshop students.

We will close the 2010 season with the **Melbourne Chamber Orchestra** with Amir Farid, piano, on Friday 22 October.

We are working on the program for 2011. So far, we know that there will be two concerts by the Melbourne Chamber Orchestra and we are negotiating with other ensembles that, we believe, will enthrall you
